Family Diversity Projects is a non-profit 501c(3) organization devoted to educating the public about issues related to the diversity of family life. Family Diversity Projects creates touring photo-text exhibits, books, and related educational materials and curriculum to help eliminate prejudice, stereotyping, name-calling, and harassment of people who are discriminated against due to race, national origin, religion, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, size, and disabilities of all kinds.

Family Diversity Projects currently distributes four other photo-text exhibits that they created: *Of Many Colors: Portraits of Multiracial Families*, *Love Makes A Family: Portraits of Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender People and their Families*, *In Our Family: Portraits of All Kinds of Families*, and *Nothing To Hide: Mental Illness in the Family*.

Founded by two of the artists who created these exhibits—photographer, Gigi Kaeser and interviewer/editor, Peggy Gillespie—Family Diversity Projects also provides speakers and workshop leaders for conferences, schools, colleges, workplaces, and other exhibit venues.

What Is The Road To Freedom?

The Road To Freedom is a traveling photo-text exhibit that can come to your community. It includes twenty color photographs by Gigi Kaeser and text edited from interviews conducted by journalist Peggy Gillespie and students at the Four Rivers Charter School. This powerful exhibit documents the experiences, lives, and families of children, teens, and adults whose lives are affected by the full spectrum of physical, sensory, learning, and mental disabilities including cerebral palsy, polio, cystic fibrosis, learning disabilities, bipolar disorder, post-traumatic stress syndrome, quadriplegia, blindness, deafness, stroke, multiple sclerosis, Asperger's syndrome, autism, Down syndrome and congenital heart disease.

The Road To Freedom gives people with disabilities the opportunity to tell their stories and share glimpses of their everyday lives in order to help challenge stereotypes and reduce prejudice and discrimination. Carmen Rosa Rosada, a woman in the exhibit who has quadriplegia, recently received her master's degree in mathematics. She said, "Many people stare at me and I would like them to treat me as a human being. After all, each person has their own limitations in one way or another. People with disabilities are just like everybody else."
